The paper introduces porcine bodies as landscapes upon which *caste* as wildness, primitive, or savage are inscribed and asserted in India, by the Hindu Right *and* the Dalit Right, to respectively advance parochial nationalisms. Caste advances or obstructs political and economic power, and is interlocked with market capitalism, which relies on nature – and casteised subhuman/nonhuman bodies - as both profitable (and venerable), and expendable (and despicable). Focussing on Chennai, this paper focusses the pig, ecologically and sociologically wild and promiscuous, as enmeshed in a long-enduring *caste* conflict around Brahmin/Dravida;

Hindu/Tamil; civilised/primitive; and even, human/animal binaries. It specifies *species* as also core to identity politics, as part of a transformative praxis to a post-casteist society.

Yamini Narayanan is Senior Lecturer in International and Community Development at Deakin University, Melbourne. Her work explores how animals are instrumentalised in sectarian, casteist and fascist ideologies in India. Yamini is a Fellow of the Oxford Centre for Animal Ethics (FOCAE), an honour that is conferred through nomination or invitation only.
