












My primary reason for taking the course.




The approximate number of classes or labs that I did not attend




Relative to other courses I have taken at UVic, the workload in this course was



The approximate number of hours per week I spent studying for this course outside of class time:





Comment

The readings (though very relevant to study) are overwhelming

Less jargon filled articles that were difficult for beginners.

I think the coursespaces page could have been organized a little better. I found it difficult to find assignment guidelines on occasion.

Some of the in class activities seemed to be a bit of a waste of time and I would have preferred a bit more of a focused lecture. For instance, the day we were supposed to bring in pictures/markers to plan our assignment was fairly pointless.

A few quizzes would have personally helped motivate me to complete the readings, but as its a third year course, that motivation should come from within. Quizzes would have been easier than coursespaces forums, in my opinion.

could have had more material/lectures and better assignments that actually reflected what we learned, i didn't particularly feel that the monument analysis or the group project helped me express my knowledge of archaeology of death at all, maybe exams would be better for this kind of course

The forum posts were a useful tool, but easy to forget, if there was a way to set up on course spaces a reminder to

do them, that would be helpful.

It would have helped to go over more concepts rather than so many specific case studies.

The forum assignments and what exactly was needed from the students (ie correct citations, length, amount of time spent working on them, and how many of each type) should have been explain clearly within the first week of school rather than at random points throughout the first month and half after students had already done several posts. Also the grade percentages for assignments In comparison to the workload seemed disproportionate. The cemetery group analysis was only worth 10% but was a huge amount of work which was frustrating as it didn't seem worth it for such a small part of our grade. Overall the workload of this class seemed too heavy, we have four other classes we are also trying to be successful in.

Have a midterm, I learn more by having to memorize things.

Erin taught everything very well! Nothing to suggest.

I would have prefered less group work time and more lecture. I felt the group work time was not necessary. I did like the in class activities though, discussions are always helpful.

While I loved getting in groups for the projects, I would have liked to change things up, and try working with other people on different projects.

I think she's doing an amazing job, and she's improving the courses in her own way even as the semester rolls on.

Some of the assignments seemed confusing at times (assignment guidelines spread all over coursespaces).

Clearer marking errors

Erin was so well organized, almost too organized to the point that the course was categorized and segmented into a difficult-to-follow way.

Everything was great!

The rubrics were not at all an effective way of expressing your expectations. One value to another is very subjective, please re-think them, it was quite stressful trying to guess what would meet these criteria or not. I got a lot of mixed messages about the forum assignments. On the one hand you and Fionn would stress not to spend hours on the posts but on the other hand the two of you had very high standards about citations and content, I was intimidated and confused by it.

Nothing.

Less time needs to be spent in lectures going over project requirements. Details can be posted online where students can access them. We don't need to talk about the projects / forums every class. This is a 300 level course, we don't need to go over in detail what kinship and gender on. Too much time wasted on things like this.

Some of the readings I found were unimportant to the course.

Maybe if we had some more guest speakers, they're always pretty insightful.

Clearer instructions/expectations for assignments

I found that some of the assignment instructions were unclear, with some ambiguous information that was hard to find out exactly what you wanted from it or how to do it.

Comment

Decrease the number of readings slightly? There's a lot of coursework in this one, and it can be hard to keep up with the readings on top of the weekly forum assignments and the larger group projects.

Perhaps less emphasis on readings?

Please have a more detailed outline of what is required for the forum assignments. It felt like we only really knew what we to do after we did them wrong.

The readings were a little too extensive, with 2-3 readings every week that can be up to 25 pages on top of readings for 4 other classes makes it very difficult to stay caught up. The forums were a good way to keep people motivated to participate, but I felt they were a little stressful and ambiguous in marking.

Longer class hours. Squishing topics in a small time frame feels a bit rushed and leaves less time for discussions

The forum assignments could have been more clear as to how you were marking us. The rubric was posted after we had submitted one or two and sometimes the forum would close early which was a cause of frustration. Also, it might be nice to have an easy to check form telling us how many forum assignments we have done and what

categories they were. In general, just take a look at the forum assignment and tweek it a bit.

Maybe put the course files and assessment area in the same spot, or move the course files up to the top so it is easier to access? I often found I couldn't find the information I was looking for.

The forums and there criteria need to be laid out better. I found that I had to spend way too much time on them for the marks that they're worth and I still wasn't sure if I was doing enough. For a student with 5 classes the forums can be a bit of a burden.

Remove the intentionally vague notion of "exceeds expectations" for purposes of marks; this does not help the students in anyway. "Exceeds expectations" does not gauge a students understanding of the material, all it does is create a hidden and arbitrary set of requirements to every submission that determines the students mark, it only serves to punish those that follow the instructions, requirements, and criteria of assignments.

For a personal preference, a quiz or two on readings or discussions. Other than that, the course was excellent all around. Really enjoyed it. Thank you Erin!

though i understand why the teacher did it, i did not enjoy the hand holding throughout the semester with each of our projects, felt more like i was in high school than in a third level university course, there was too much emphasis on the projects and preparing for them than there was on the learning, overall i don't feel i learned much more about archaeology of death than before i took the class

The guest lecture about field schools, though it was interesting, wasn't as relevant in what it covered than it could have been to the course content at the time that the lecture was given.

The work load in this course was quite a lot compared to my other classes and it was sometimes difficult to keep on top of everything.

Perhaps instead of two large group projects, take one out and make a midterm exam or an individual project. Te group projects near the end of term are very hard time wise to complete as everyone in the group has many things on the go and it's very hard to get meet and make sure everyone can put in equal effort

It would be nice if we had to complete less forums.

All was well done and I think the course was good and interesting

Perhaps integrate the readings more into the lectures or discussions, they felt a little pointless and there are a lot of them.

Nothing much really. I was a little frustrated at how much work the monument analysis took, while it was worth very little.

Possible in class time to work on group projects, would only need one lecture.

It would also help to have time deadlines for forums listed (errors in the first half of the forum end times)

There seemed to be a disconnect between the lectures and the assignments although I did find both informative.

I am unsure how it could be improved because it is so well formulated. The only this is that on course spaces, everything is categorized so much that I never really know where to find everything, but it was great.

The course content was quite interesting, but most of the examples centered around Europe since Dr. McGuire specializes in Saxon and Viking burials. Perhaps more information and examples from around the world and different cultural contexts could improve the content and allow students to have a broader understanding of the relationship between the living and the dead. I find that European burial traditions tend to be overemphasized in anthropology, and it would have been really interesting to learn something new from other belief systems and paradigms.

I liked pretty much everything about this class. Normally it's not the case with Dr McGuire's classes but I found with this one that it took a very long time to get anything graded and returned, which wasn't super good. The monument project was fun and it was nice to explore real fieldwork! Not quite as fond of the digital archaeology project, I think I would have preferred a poster, but that's just my personal opinion - everything was good other than that!

I would strongly recommend you reorganize the course spaces page it was difficult to find information. Ideally one place for each project. As it is now things are spread out under the weekly category, course files, the intro page, an assessment page. I spent 20 minutes looking for the guidelines for an assignment. I can understand the layout of the page now, but at the beginning of the course it was extremely confusing.

I would suggest making a change to the 6 forum posts that we did. The idea is good, but with a full course load it is very easy to forget about them or to put other work ahead of them. Either taking them out or changing them to be small comprehension paragraphs/essays with a bit more weight might make them a bit more effective.

Was hoping subject material would extend beyond europe

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Less emphasis on the online portion. This class is already very work heavy and both me and my group struggled to complete the online component.

While I understand that why group work is important, I don't think it's fair to have such a large part of the course mark based on the group projects. If someone gets stuck with bad partners, it can easily ruin their grade. That being said, Dr. McGuire mase it clear that she was willing to help out any groups that were struggling, etc.

Nothing really, great course

Readings were hard to keep up with for someone with a full course load and family/work commitments (although they were really interesting), forum assignment had tech issues that made it frustrating

There is a large amount of reading for this class, and I am worried about the take-home final, as I have heard that it includes all of the readings from the entire semester. Readings are a good way to keep us on track with the course info, but between this class, a job, my other courses and trying not to spend every waking moment in front of a computer screen I fell behind on the readings fairly fast. Even if there was a small quiz or something part-way through the semester on the readings to that point it would be better, but trying to stay engaged with the readings for 3 months, while waiting for them to become mandatory to the class is a bit difficult.
