First responders are trained to use **objective, plain language communication** for both intra-agency coordination (team-to-team) and interaction with the public. This approach ensures clarity, prevents confusion, and promotes trust in high-pressure situations.

Within First Responder Teams

- **Clarity and Efficiency:** The use of clear, objective language is crucial for efficient radio communication and seamless integration between different agencies (e.g., fire, police, EMS) during large or complex incidents.
- **Reduced Ambiguity:** The federal government and many agencies actively discourage the use of complex or localized "10-codes" in favor of plain language to avoid misunderstandings, especially when multiple jurisdictions cooperate.
- **Factual Reporting:** Communication in reports and during scene handovers must be purely objective, based on facts and observations, to ensure accurate medical records and legal documentation.


With Patients and the Public

- **Building Trust:** Responders use objective, yet empathetic, language to establish rapport with patients. Introducing themselves, explaining their role, and describing procedures in simple terms helps patients feel secure and informed.
- **Managing Expectations:** By providing accurate and honest information, first responders manage public and patient expectations without offering false reassurance (e.g., not promising "everything will be fine" if uncertain).
- **De-escalation:** A calm, confident, and objective tone of voice is a primary tool for de-escalating agitated individuals and encouraging cooperation from those who may be in shock or fear.
- **Accessibility:** Responders use simple language, avoiding medical jargon, and repeat important information as necessary, acknowledging that a person's ability to process information can be significantly reduced in a crisis.

In essence, objective speaking is a core professional competency that enhances safety and effectiveness for both first responders and the people they are helping.
